

From the Principal

Dear Parents,

Over the past few weeks I have been conducting interviews for Kindergarten 2017. This is always an enjoyable task as I have the pleasure of meeting new parents and reconnecting with existing families. I found this article very interesting and hope you enjoy reading it...

Being a parent is a wonderful privilege but it is also very challenging, sometimes scary and on occasion, puzzling. When Mary and Joseph found their twelve year old son Jesus in the temple after three days of anxious searching, Mary was unable to restrain herself and said to Jesus, 'Son, why have you treated us so? Your father and I have been looking for you anxiously.' (Luke 2:48). Mary's statement showed that she was not always able to understand the conduct of her child. This is some comfort for parents as they witness the growing-up conduct of their own children.

Recent studies tell us that parents spend as little as two to five minutes a day in meaningful conversation with their teenagers. Telling children to clean their room, go to bed, get up, clean their teeth and go to school do not count as meaningful conversation. Two to five minutes a day, no matter how meaningful, is simply not enough to compete with the multitude and variety of influences being presented to children. We need to spend a meaningful amount of time with our children so we can get to know what's going on in their lives, what they are thinking and what are the outside influences that are forming their moral and ethical values.

Spending time raising responsible children who are happy, self disciplined and able to think for themselves is a worthwhile goal. Finding out how you can help your children towards that end is the responsibility of parents. Children rely on parents to bring a mature adult perspective to parenting and to be the children's main influence. For example, discipline is not a process of trying to win a battle, to eventually force a child to give in: neither is it about reward and punishment. It is about teaching your children to manage themselves.

The role of parents is to guide their children towards self discipline. Parents need to remove themselves from the 'good guy- bad guy' role and be free to be their children's confidants, supporters and role models.'

Thank you to the many parents who attended the parent/teacher interviews this week. Your interest and enthusiasm towards your children's learning is much appreciated.

Some weeks ago several students from years five and six took part in a writing competition '**What matters?**' organised by The University of Western Sydney. I am thrilled to announce that Miriam Warwick Smith (Year five St Aidan's) was awarded the prize for Runner Up in the year five - six division. Miriam's essay was titled '**Relationships matter**' and she with her parents will attend an Awards Ceremony at UWS on 2nd August. Congratulations Miriam. Well done. The St Aidan's community salutes you!

Congratulations to the Stage Two soccer team who came second at the Gala day yesterday. Well done, boys!
